1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

This Act may be cited as the "North Platte Canteen

7 The Congress finds the following:

Congressional Gold Medal Act".

SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

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1	(1) Home-front volunteerism was integral to the
2	victory of the United States during World War II
3	Numerous exemplars of patriotism emerged through-
4	out the Midwest, galvanizing the rural United States
5	and the rest of the country supporting the war ef-
6	fort.
7	(2) The North Platte Canteen in North Platte
8	Nebraska was one of the largest volunteer efforts of
9	World War II.
10	(3) Canteen services boosted morale in the
11	United States by providing free, wholesome enter-
12	tainment to troops traveling across the country. Ap-
13	proximately 120 community-based canteens operated
14	in the United States during World War II.
15	(4) The North Platte Canteen greeted and
16	served food to approximately 6,000,000 U.S. troops
17	traveling across the United States from December
18	25, 1941 to April 1, 1946.
19	(5) On December 17, 1941, the residents of
20	North Platte, Nebraska received information that a
21	train of Nebraska National Guardsmen would be
22	traveling through North Platte en route to the West
23	Coast of the United States. Although the train car-
24	ried members of the Kansas National Guard, resi-
25	dents of the community welcomed the men from

Kansas with food and other items as an appreciation
 for their service.
 (6) On December 18, 1941, Rae Wilson, of

North Platte, proposed to her community the idea of establishing the North Platte Canteen so that residents could greet U.S. troops en route to serving the United States in the European Theater or the Pacific Theater.

- (7) 55,000 individuals, the majority of whom were women, from 125 communities in Nebraska, Colorado, and Kansas donated food and volunteered at the North Platte Canteen for approximately 5 years.
- (8) The North Platte Canteen provided hospitality to as many as 24 troop trains per day. During a 1-month period, the Canteen's volunteers served over 40,000 homemade cookies, 30,000 hard-boiled eggs, 6,500 doughnuts, 4,000 loaves of bread, 3,000 pounds of meat, 450 pounds of cheese, 60 quarts of peanut butter, 1,350 pounds of coffee, 1,000 quarts of cream, 750 dozen rolls and 600 birthday cakes.
- (9) The North Platte Canteen principally operated at the Union Pacific Railroad station in North Platte, Nebraska with volunteers from local commu-

1 nities, organizations, churches, schools, and other 2 groups, and without Federal assistance. 3 (10) \$137,000 in cash contributions supported 4 the North Platte Canteen's operations for almost 5 5 years. The funds were raised through benefit dances, 6 scrap-metal drives, school victory clubs, donation 7 cans in local businesses, and from the relatives of 8 troops who traveled through the North Platte area. 9 (11) In December 1943, the North Platte Can-10 teen was honored by the United States Army with 11 the presentation of the Meritorious Wartime Service 12 Award by the Secretary of War. 13 (12) In 2004, the 108th Congress passed a res-14 olution recognizing the heroic efforts of those who 15 made enormous sacrifices to make the North Platte 16 Canteen a success during World War II. 17 SEC. 3. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL. 18 (a) Presentation Authorized.—The Speaker of 19 the House of Representatives and the President pro tempore of the Senate shall make appropriate arrangements 21 for the presentation, on behalf of Congress, of a gold medal of appropriate design to the individuals and commu-23 nities who volunteered or donated items to the North Platte Canteen in North Platte, Nebraska during World 25 War II.

- 1 (b) Design and Striking.—For purposes of the
- 2 presentation described in subsection (a), the Secretary of
- 3 the Treasury (referred to in this Act as the "Secretary")
- 4 shall strike a gold medal with suitable emblems, devices,
- 5 and inscriptions to be determined by the Secretary.
- 6 (c) Lincoln County Historical Museum.—Fol-
- 7 lowing the award of the gold medal under subsection (a),
- 8 the gold medal shall be given to the Lincoln County His-
- 9 torical Museum in North Platte, Nebraska, where it will
- 10 be available for display as appropriate and available for
- 11 research.

12 SEC. 4. DUPLICATE MEDALS.

- 13 The Secretary may strike and sell duplicates in
- 14 bronze of the gold medal struck under section 3, at a price
- 15 sufficient to cover the costs of the medals, including labor,
- 16 materials, dies, use of machinery, and overhead expenses.

17 SEC. 5. STATUS OF MEDALS.

- 18 (a) National Medals.—Medals struck pursuant to
- 19 this Act are national medals for purposes of chapter 51
- 20 of title 31, United States Code.
- 21 (b) Numismatic Items.—For purposes of section
- 22 5134 of title 31, United States Code, all medals struck
- 23 under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic items.

1 SEC. 6. AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS; PROCEEDS OF

- 2 SALE.
- 3 (a) AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS.—There is
- 4 authorized to be charged against the United States Mint
- 5 Public Enterprise Fund such amounts as may be nec-
- 6 essary to pay for the costs of the medals struck under
- 7 this Act.
- 8 (b) PROCEEDS OF SALE.—Amounts received from the
- 9 sale of duplicate bronze medals authorized under section
- 10 4 shall be deposited into the United States Mint Public
- 11 Enterprise Fund.
